



# Greater Cincinnati Voter Attitudes on Transportation Issues


Key Findings of a Regional Voter Survey Commissioned by the Cincinnati USA Regional Chamber and Conducted May 20-24, 2017

#### Methodology

- > 800 interviews with voters in Greater Cincinnati:
  - 200 voters in Hamilton County, and an additional 200 to yield a total sample of 400 on key questions
  - 200 in Butler, Clermont, and Warren Counties in Ohio
  - 200 voters in Dearborn County, Indiana, and Boone, Campbell and Kenton counties in Kentucky



- All data weighted to reflect the true geographic distribution of voters in the region
- Margin of sampling error of ±4.6% at the 95% confidence interval for the overall sample
- Conducted May 20-24, 2017, via landline and cell phones among voters who participated in the November 2016 election
- Due to rounding, some percentages do not add up to 100%











#### Issue Context






# Regional Attitudes About Transportation

### Voters in the region overwhelmingly rely on driving alone to get around.




# About two-thirds see a benefit to public transportation, and feel that the current transportation system is outdated.

Our regional transportation infrastructure is outdated, unreliable and inefficient




# Voters see personal benefits from the bus system, even when they don't use it; they also want to spend less time in their cars.

In general, how much need would you say that there is for more money to\_\_\_\_\_?




### Highways are a much higher priority than public transit.

Our top transportation priority should be building, repairing, and 52% expanding roads and highways OR Our top transportation priority should be improving and 36% expanding public transportation, including trains and buses Both/Neither/ 13% Don't know/NA

### Voters strongly prefer fixing the roads and highways we have over expanding them.




### Fix-it-first is a higher priority across party and geographic groups.






# Voter Support for Transportation Investments


# Conceptually, voters are split on their willingness to pay additional taxes to fund *regional* improvements.




### A narrow majority in Hamilton County is willing to pay 0.5% in new sales taxes.




# Transit for seniors and people with disabilities, basic repairs, and the Brent Spence Bridge are top priorities.

### Bike lanes, ride-hailing availability, bus stops and shelters and the streetcar are less urgent.










# Views of Tolls and the Brent Spence Bridge


### Three in five agree that tolls are a fair way to fund transportation improvements.

"Tolls are a fair way to fund transportation improvements."




### Majorities of voters in all regions agree that tolls are an appropriate funding source.
