


Collectively, you represent a larger shared vision for Valley business. Your innovation and entrepreneurial spirit will help shape what's next for our community, and for that we are grateful.



Your mentor: I have been fortunate to have several, however my mother believed in me the most.



Your mentor: Jason Duff.


Advice you would give to the next generation: Don't forget the importance of real-world, face-to-face interaction.



Three most memorable moments in business: The first day that I started as executive director of Living United for Change in Arizona, walking into the office early in the morning and I remember the feeling of wonder, excitement and fear; when our organizations submitted the 280,000 signatures for Proposition 206 last year, it was the first big achievement of the Prop. 206 campaign that has led to a minimum wage increase and the implementation of earned sick time; the moment I was informed I had been selected to the promotion of sergeant while in the U.S. Marines.


Advice you would give to the next generation: Be mindful of the world around you, including the people in it and always try to think outside of yourself. You never know what burdens someone else is carrying.
