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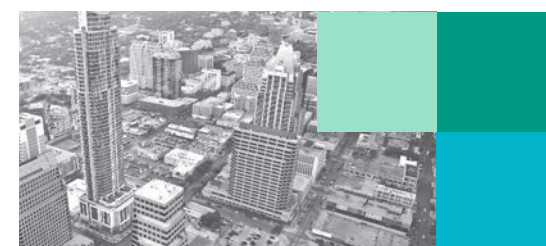

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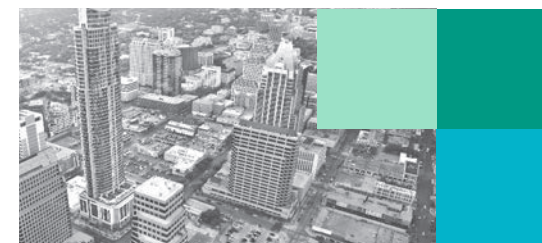

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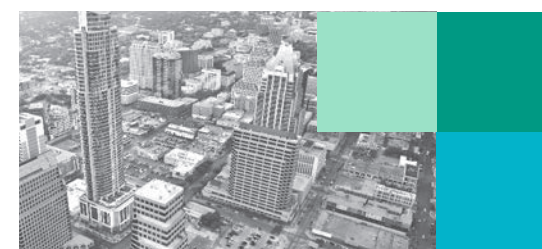

As a member of the Travis County Child Protection Team, the Center for Child Protection's mission is to reduce the trauma for children during the investigation and prosecution of crimes against children.

► PROGRAMS, SERVICES, GOALS

The Center for Child Protection is a nationally accredited children's advocacy center and the only nonprofit in Travis County involved in the investigation and prosecution of crimes against children. The Center is the first stop for children in Travis County who are suspected victims of sexual abuse, physical abuse and for children who have witnessed a violent crime. The Center is a child-friendly, specially-equipped facility where children go for recorded forensic interviews, medical exams, counseling and intervention. 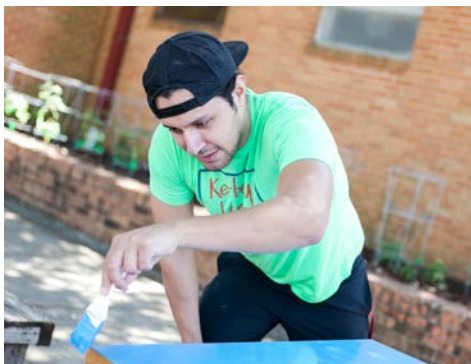

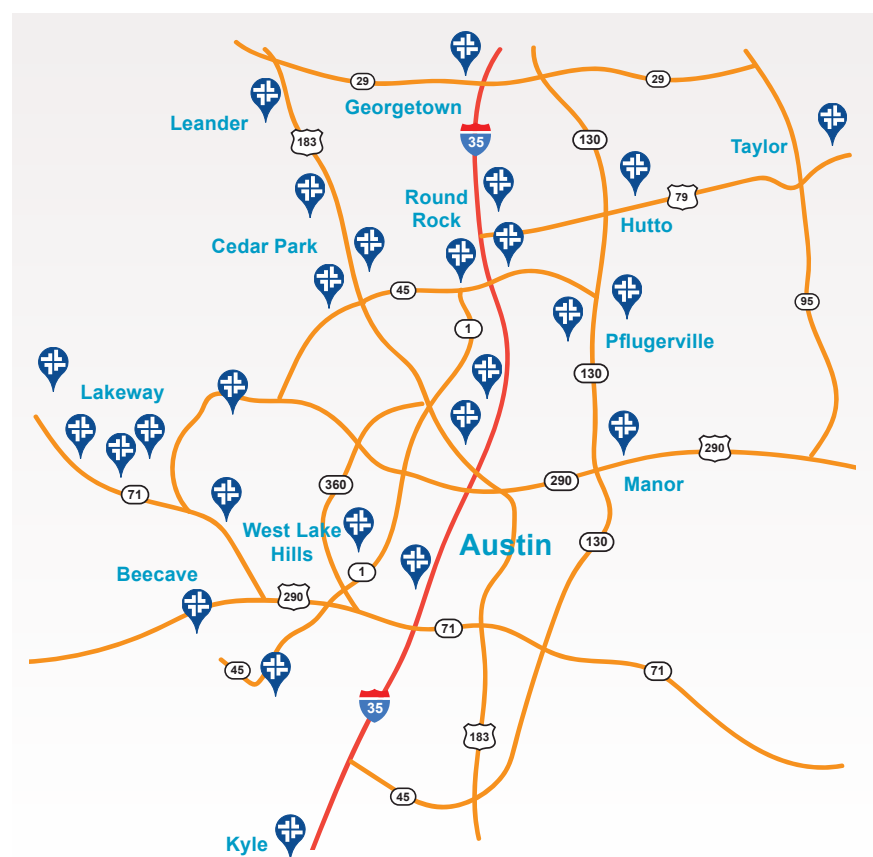

► MISSION AND IMPACT STATEMENT

The mission of Ronald McDonald House Charities of Central Texas (RMHC CTX) is to create, find and support programs that directly improve the health and well-being of children and families. RMHC CTX has supported thousands of families through four programs: Ronald McDonald House[®], Ronald McDonald Family Rooms[®], Healing Hearts and Happy Wheels Carts.

In 2016, we served 2,470 families by providing 10,488 room nights at the Ronald McDonald House and Ronald McDonald Family Rooms, saving them an estimated \$2.4 million in food and lodging expenses.

► PROGRAMS, SERVICES, GOALS

RMHC CTX keep families close to the care their sick children need. Our programs ensure families have access to quality healthcare and can stay together during treatment without having to worry about the financial costs of lodging and food. The 30-guest suite **Ronald McDonald House** supports families that have children receiving treatment at any Austin-area hospital or medical facility and live at least 25 miles or more away from the House. Our "home-away-from-home" is open year-round, 24 hours a day and supports our families' basic needs so they can focus on their children.

When a family walks into a Ronald McDonald Family Room, we want them to forget they're in a hospital. RMHC CTX has five **Ronald McDonald Family Rooms** located within Central Texas hospitals to support families with children in the neonatal or pediatric intensive care units. Family Rooms are a refuge from the hospital environment and provide families an opportunity to rest while remaining close to their children. The nurturing spaces have living rooms, sleep rooms, kitchens with snacks and drinks, laundry facilities, bathrooms, and Internet access. There are no geographical restrictions to use the Family Room.

Designed to stroll the hospital hallways, the **Happy Wheels Carts** provide complimentary juice, snacks, small toys and books to help families as they wait by their children's bedside. The carts are manned by volunteers at three Bryan/College Station hospitals and two Austin hospitals.

Families who tragically lose children are supported through our **Healing Hearts** program which provides burial assistance and bereavement support programs with licensed counselors in Austin and Brazos Valley.

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Central Texas (BBBS) exists to help children succeed in life. We do this by pairing children ages 6-16 with caring adults who serve as mentors, advocates, resources and guides. Our proven model of one-to-one mentoring helps kids build the skills and capacities that lead to lifelong success.

▶ PROGRAMS, SERVICES, GOALS

BBBS creates and supports strong and caring relationships between adult volunteers (Bigs) and children (Littles) that change kids' lives for the better, forever. Volunteers in the BBBS mentoring program commit to meeting with their Little 3-4 times per month for a minimum of one year.

BBBS serves hundreds of children in Travis, Williamson and Hays counties on any given day. Last year, more than 95% of the children served by BBBS intended to finish high school and 98% of them improved or maintained their grades. To achieve these outcomes, volunteers donated over 55,000 hours of their time and staff conducted 6,892 interactions with program participants. In 2016, BBBS also awarded \$375,000 in new college scholarships to Littles as part of the agency's Scholarship Program.

▶ MISSION STATEMENT

The Round Rock Area Serving Center, a Texas non-profit corporation, also known as the Serving Center, carries out a community-wide mission of churches, other organizations and individuals serving human needs in the City of Round Rock and surrounding areas.



▶ PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

Services provided include a food pantry, Keep Round Rock Warm, clothing & furniture vouchers, Computers for Kids, community gardens, The Volunteer Center, adult computer classes in English & Spanish, a charity resale store, and financial assistance for utilities, rent, prescriptions, transportation, and temporary lodging.

In 2016, the Serving Center assisted a total of 45,993 under-privileged, low-income people and families-in-crisis from 11,921 households with food and financial assistance. The food pantry filled a total of 11,044 food vouchers, and 6,751 households were served from Fresh Food for Families. A total of \$817,002 was spent on client services, and \$121,381 was given in clothing and furniture vouchers. The Serving Center is a partner agency of the Central Texas Food Bank. The Serving Center assists 1,100 households every month.

The Serving Center is primarily staffed by 250 volunteers and 6.5 paid staff. Volunteer opportunities include food pantry, social work case management, cashiering, thrift store, gardening, truck driving, and computer refurbishing.

Treasures Charity Resale Shop & Boutique is an upscale clothing and furniture thrift store that is open to the public. Clients shop with vouchers for clothing and furniture. 

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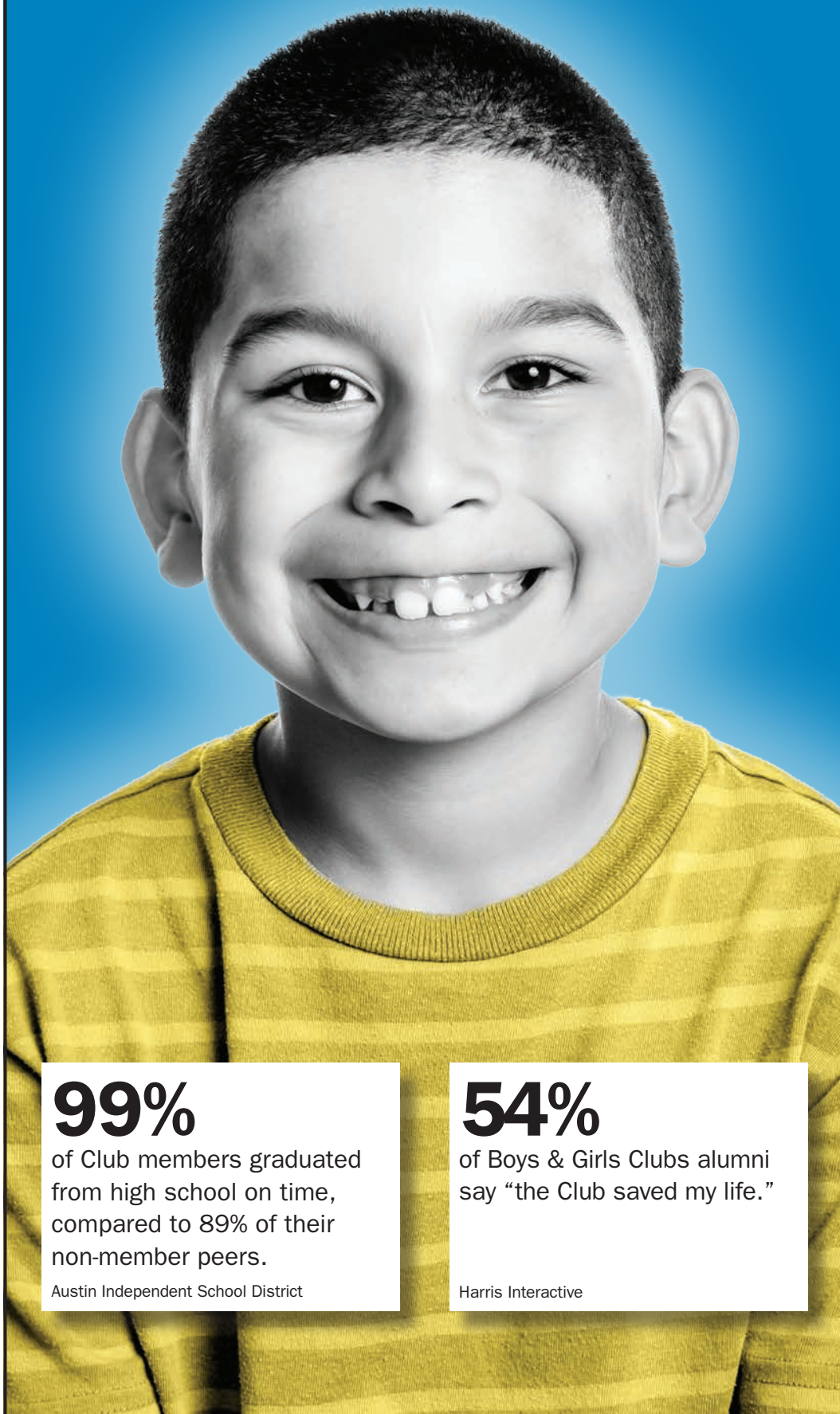

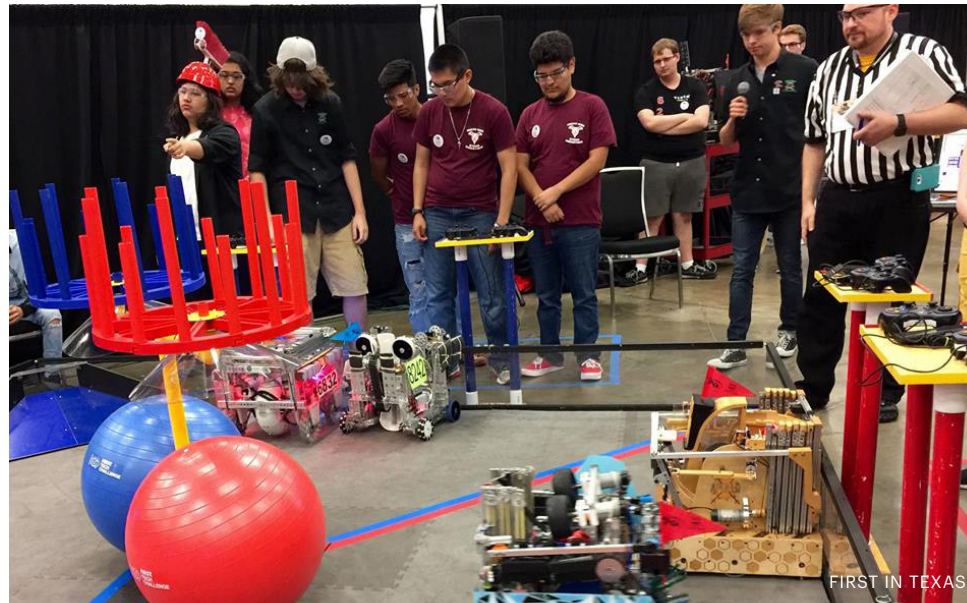

CASA volunteers come from every walk of life and share a commitment to improving children's lives, a willingness to learn, and an open mind towards life experiences different from their own. Volunteers complete an interview, background checks and a 39-hour intensive training program. After being sworn in by a judge, volunteers are appointed to a child or family of children and spend an average of 15-20 hours a month advocating for these children for at least a year. For children who've been abused or neglected, CASA means having a home instead of feeling lost, and being a priority instead of feeling invisible. For volunteers, CASA is a life-changing experience that makes our community a better place. To learn more about becoming a CASA volunteer, visit www.casatexas.org/volunteer or call 512.459.2272.

least 21 years of age and be able to pass extensive reference, Child Protective Services, sex offender registry and criminal background checks before becoming a CASA volunteer. If an attorney, you may not concurrently be appointed to any cases involving Child Protective Services in Travis County. The CASA Volunteer Training program consists of 8 in-person classes and 3 hours of courtroom observation (approximately 39 hours total) completed over a 5-week cycle. You must finish all training and observation within the 5 weeks and all background checks must be completed and cleared in order to be assigned to a case.

What tasks do you need volunteers to do? Tasks may include harvesting, weeding, planting, composting, cleaning and prepping produce for donation, and other tasks as needed by the farm staff.

Are there any requirements (age, training sessions, etc.)? The minimum age to volunteer is 10 years old. Children 10-13 years old must be accompanied by an adult (minimum 1 adult per 3 children), and minors ages 14-17 years old are allowed to volunteer without an accompanying adult with the proper form. All minors must bring a signed parental consent form on each visit to the farm.

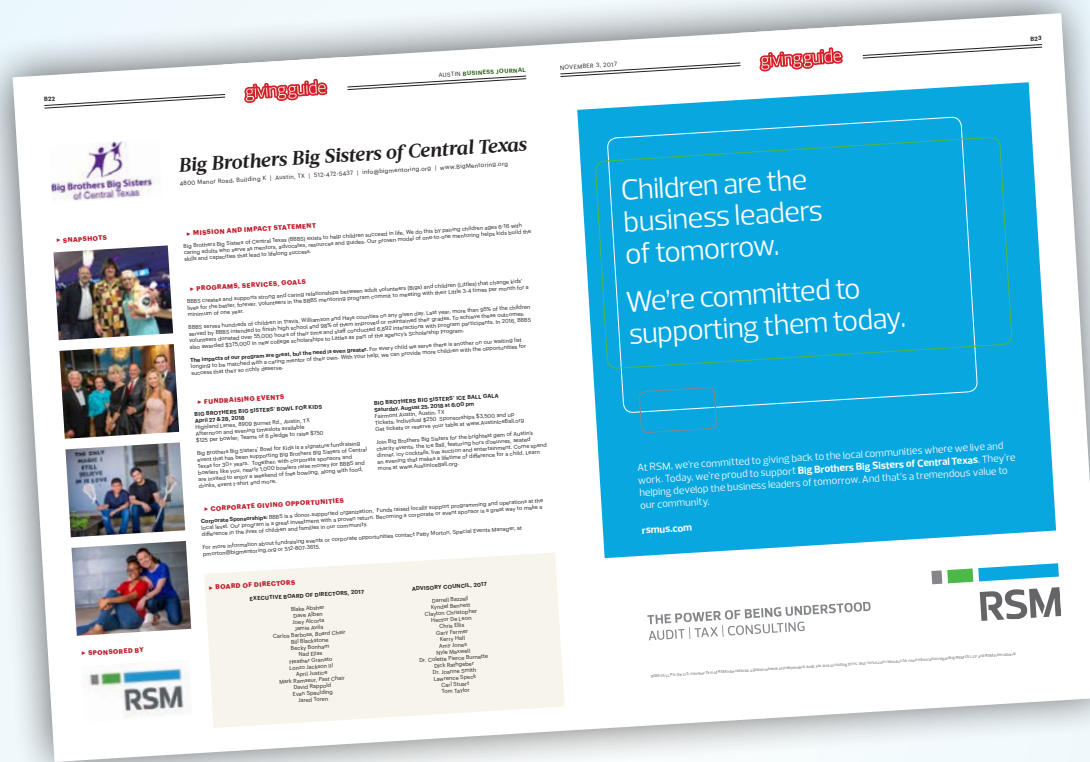
